

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






Early Childhood Community Support Entities - Small Group

AND HOW DO THEY RELATE TO TOXIC STRESS?








The more ACEs a child experiences, the more likely he or she is to suffer from things like heart disease and diabetes, poor academic achievement, and substance abuse later in life.


TOXIC STRESS EXPLAINS HOW A(ES

Experiencing many ACEs, as well as things like racism and community violence, without supportive adults, can cause what's known as toxic stress. This excessive activation of the stressresponse system can lead to longlasting wear-andtear on the body and brain.



The effect would be similar to revving a car engine for days or weeks at a time.

WE CAN REDUCE THE EFFECTS OF A(ES AND TOXIC STRESS.



For those who have experienced ACEs, there are a range of possible responses that can help, including therapeutic sessions with mental health professionals, meditation, physical exercise, spending time in nature, and many others.





Likewise, fostering strong, responsive relationships between children and their caregivers, and helping children and adults build core life skills, can help to buffer a child from the effects of toxic stress.

ACEs affect people at all income and social levels, and can have serious, costly impact across the lifespan.

No one who's experienced significant adversity (or many ACEs) is irreparably damaged,

though we need to acknowledge trauma's effects on their lives. By reducing families' sources of stress, providing children and adults with responsive relationships, and strengthening the core life skills we all need to adapt and thrive, we can prevent and counteract lasting harm.





For thousands of families in Mississippi, no matter how hard they work, financial stability grows farther out of reach with each passing day. Hidden in plain sight, these struggling households are **ALICE®** –


Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed.

ALICE households bring in income above the Federal Poverty Level, but less than the cost of basics in the counties where they live. While ALICE households have been struggling in the shadows for far too long, the irony is that we all know ALICE. In fact, we're already talking about ALICE. But many have used terms like "working poor," "the invisible," and "the forgotten" to describe ALICE because often we don't know what other term to use. United For ALICE, a national research organization from New Jersey whose work is backed by more than 300 experts nationwide, has given us a name and a way to quantify this population that we see – and rely on – each and every day.

ALICE is everywhere. ALICE can be a neighbor, a friend, a family member, or a colleague. ALICE workers typically include our child care providers, retail salespeople, cashiers, waiters, delivery drivers, gas station attendants, and caregivers.

Think for a moment about the ALICE workers you've encountered just today. Maybe you dropped off your kids at their child care center this morning. Then perhaps you filled your gas tank before you started your work day. Maybe you went to your favorite deli for lunch. Or went out to run an errand at the grocery store. There may even be an Amazon package sitting outside your door right at this very moment.


ALICE workers are the engine that makes our economy – and our daily lives – run smoothly. Yet all this time they've been overlooked and undercounted as they live each day priced out of survival and unable to make ends meet in Mississippi.



In a constant battle to make ends meet, ALICE families are forced to make impossible choices daily. Pay my heating bill, or buy healthy food for my family? Pay for child care, or work reduced hours to stay home with my child? Buy the medication I need, or pay the rent? Each day brings a new impossible decision, a new weight to lay on the shoulders of these already burdened and stressed families. And to make matters worse, many ALICE families can't access assistance that's needed – because often they bring in too much income to qualify.



Charlene is a single mother who works full time while raising her two young sons. While she works to improve the quality of area child care centers, she struggles to provide for her family. This is her story.



(Now that we've heard about ALICE's struggles from ALICE's perspective,) Let's pull back the curtain on the true extent of hardship in our communities. Here in Mississippi, nearly 221,155 households were living in poverty in 2023. That's 19% of our households. But another 345,210 households – that's 30% were ALICE, also struggling to get by.


Combined, more than 566,365 households – a staggering 49% – fell below the ALICE Threshold, the average income needed to live and work in today's economy. This is the reality of hardship in our state/county, concealed by outdated measures that have long been considered the standard.



Now let's take a closer look at some ALICE demographics. ALICE households span all ages, genders, races, and ethnicities, living in urban, suburban, and rural communities all around the country – and all across our Mississippi. But some groups experience hardship at disproportionate rates because of systemic barriers. For example, in 2023, 65% of black households in Mississippi fell below the ALICE Threshold.


Others that are more likely to struggle financially than their counterparts include:

- •Under the age of 25 years 66%
- •Single Female Headed Households with Children 81% that is 79,429 households in our state




There are also variations in hardship by location. If we look at the entire state of Mississippi broken out by county, we can see that in 2023, households were more likely to struggle in Claiborne County – with 75% of households in hardship...and least likely in Madison County, at 36%.

Even within individual counties, the rates can fluctuate. For example, in Madison County, 69% of households lived paycheck to paycheck in the Camden area, while in the City of Madison area, it was 16%.



So why is ALICE, ALICE? There are several factors that impact a household's ability to afford basics, including systemic barriers in our communities that are keeping ALICE financially trapped, no matter how hard ALICE works. But the crux of the problem is the mismatch between the ever-increasing cost of expenses, and the wages that just aren't keeping up. To understand this better, we need to look at the ALICE Household Survival Budget for families in our community – that is, the minimum cost of housing, child care, food, transportation, health care, and technology, plus taxes. For a family of four in Mississippi, the Household Survival Budget was \$70,320 in 2023. But when we combine the full-time wages of two of the most common jobs in the state – a personal care aide and a stock worker/order filler – we see that this family, with both adults working, brought in \$56,380 – \$13,940 short of the cost of basics.

And when we factor in the Federal Poverty Level, which was \$30,000, the dilemma facing countless ALICE families becomes clearer – when the Federal Poverty Level is used to determine eligibility for assistance programs such as SNAP, it's no wonder there are so many families locked out of the supports that are so desperately needed.




Let's dig a little deeper into how ALICE fits into the labor landscape in our area.

When we look specifically at the working-age population in Mississippi, only 20% had a full-time job with a salary in 2023.

Zeroing in on working-age adults specifically in the labor force, most in the state - 64% - were paid hourly and/or worked part time.

And if we look at the 20 most common jobs in the state, we can see that 16 paid less than \$20 per hour in 2023. To put that in perspective, an hourly wage of \$20 would equate to \$40,000 annually if working full time. So it's no surprise that of all the workers in these jobs, 35% struggled to make ends meet.




When wages increase at a slower rate than basic expenses, purchasing power takes a hit. This is especially tough for ALICE households, who are already struggling to make ends meet without much assistance to cushion the blow.

How has this played out in the numbers? Over more than a decade, the total number of households statewide grew by 6%.

During the same period, the number of households living in poverty in Mississippi went down by 2%, and the number of ALICE households grew by 8%.

More recently, between 2021 and 2023, the percentage of total households struggling below the ALICE Threshold dipped from 52% to 49%.



We've seen how ALICE numbers have evolved over time. But what does the future hold? The answer to that is in our hands. We have the power to alter the course for ALICE families, shaping our future for the better because when we lift up ALICE, we lift up entire communities.

This type of transformative impact takes an all-hands-on-deck approach. We all have a role to play – and there's no role that's too small. In the words of this ALICE mother, every little bit helps.

Program specific details

ADOPTION

The Mississippi Adoption Program provides permanent homes for children who have been removed from their families due to abuse, neglect, or other unsafe conditions in cases where reunification is not possible. The primary goal is to bring potential adoptive children to families seeking adoption. Adoptive parents in Mississippi receive support through monthly maintenance payments and services.

The agency utilizes various programs to provide children with adoptive families. This includes the MS Heart Gallery, which lists all children who are ready for adoption. AdoptUSKids provides information for families on recruitment, engagement, and support. The Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption's Wendy's Wonderful Kids program helps match prospective families with potential adoptive children, supporting adoption recruiters in implementing an intensive, child-focused model that allows for thorough case reviews, face-to-face relationship building, and collaboration with internal and external services.



EARLY CHILDHOOD SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES (PART B, SECTION 619)

Children from ages three to five with disabilities or developmental delays are afforded the right to a Free Appropriate Public Education in the Least Restrictive Environment through the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) Part B Section 619. This program has a duty to locate all children in the state who might be eligible for special education services and to conduct evaluations that determine their eligibility for these services. Eligibility is determined by a school district Multidisciplinary Evaluation Team, who look for criteria in the following categories:

- autism
- · deafness/blindness
- · hearing impairment
- · visual impairment
- · emotional disability
- · intellectual disability
- · language/speech impairment
- · orthopedic impairment
- · traumatic brain injury
- · specific learning disability
- · developmental delay*
- · other health impairment
- · multiple disabilities



When a child is eligible for program services, Part B, Section 619 staff oversee the creation and delivery of an Individualized Education Program (IEP) that defines the supports and services the child will receive, which are tailored to the child's specific strengths and needs. The services are provided through local school districts, known as Local Educational Agencies (LEAs). Services can include speech therapy, physical and occupational therapy, and special education support and are often integrated within preschool settings.

The Mississippi Department of Education is focusing on improving program standards and professional development for Part B, Section 619 providers to enhance the quality of services.

*The program defines a developmental delay as 1.5 standard deviations below the standard mean of an assessment or a developmental age that is 25% below the child's chronological age on an assessment based on age equivalents in two or more areas.




Getting Involved




